December 27, 2017 Medical and religious exemptions in all New Hampshire Schools:

The NH Law states that a student can have a religious or medical exemption to required school immunization requirements. The exact wording of the statute (law) for both medical and religious exemptions is noted here: Section-141-C:20-c Exemptions – A child shall be exempt from immunization if:

- I. A physician licensed under RSA 329, or a physician exempted under RSA 329:21, III, certifies that immunization against a particular disease may be detrimental to the child's health. The exemption shall exist only for the length of time, in the opinion of the physician; such immunization would be detrimental to the child. An exemption from immunization for one disease shall not affect other required immunizations.
- II. A parent or legal guardian objects to immunization because of religious beliefs. The parent or legal guardian shall sign a notarized form stating that the child has not been immunized because of religious beliefs.

Medical Exemption:

To receive an exemption of immunization for <u>medical reasons</u> from vaccines in a school, the parent or legal guardian of the child must acquire written documentation from a licensed physician or authorized health care provider that certifies that immunization against a particular disease may be detrimental to the child's health. The exemption shall only exist only for the length of time; such immunization would be detrimental to the child.

Here are a couple examples of medical exemptions that you may encounter:

- An individual with an allergy to a vaccine component;
- An individual receiving chemotherapy.

In the examples noted above, an individual with an allergy to a vaccine component may have a permanent contraindication for receipt of the vaccine(s), whereas the individual receiving chemotherapy may have a temporary contraindication to receipt of the vaccine(s). In both instances, the exemption length of time is at the direction of the licensed physician or authorized health care provider.

Religious Exemptions:

A parent or legal guardian who objects to a vaccine or vaccines because of religious beliefs for their child must provide a signed and notarized Religious Exemption form. This document can be for one or more vaccines or all vaccines.
