## CHARACTER AND CITIZENSHIP EDUCATION

Character and citizenship education are a shared responsibility of teachers and administrators. Teaching in the area of character and citizenship will take place throughout the K-12 program. In addition, curriculum development teams will integrate the following principles, as appropriate, into the curriculum.

- 1. Pursuant to Part 2, Article 83 of the New Hampshire Constitution, humanity, benevolence, and truth and honesty with self and others.
- 2. Fairness, integrity, and justice.
- 3. Respect, courtesy, and human worth.
- 4. Community service.
- 5. The rights and responsibilities of citizenship.
- 6. Each individual has dignity and worth.
- 7. A free society requires respect for persons, property, and principles, and for self.
- 8. Each individual has a right to learn and the freedom to achieve.
- 9. Each individual, regardless of race, creed, color, sex, ethnic background, or economic status, has the right to equal opportunity.
- 10. Each individual has the right to personal liberties.
- 11. Each individual is responsible for his/her own actions, and should exercise self-discipline where and when appropriate.
- 12. Each individual has a responsibility to the group as well as to the total society.
- 13. A democratic government is established by majority vote.
- 14. Democratic societies are based on law.
- 15. Problems are solved through reason and orderly processes.
- 16. An individual should be tolerant of another's beliefs and should have freedom to express his/her own.
- 17. Each individual has the right to work, to pursue an occupation, and to gain satisfaction from personal efforts.
